RE: Tule Red Habitat Restoration Project – Phase 2 Bid

SFCWA received two competitive bid proposals for Phase 2 construction of the Tule Red Habitat Restoration Project, one from The Dutra Group and one from FourM Construction. The bid amounts are summarized below. Detailed bidding sheets are attached.

The Dutra Group

Base Bid \$1,439,487.00 Additive Bid \$408,750.00 Total \$1,848,237.00

FourM Construction

Base Bid \$2,004,609.00 Additive Bid \$430,770.00 Total \$2,475,379.00

KSN (our construction manager) has reviewed the bids and found both to be responsive to the solicitation requirements.

Based on the two bids received, I am recommending that the Board authorize me to contract with The Dutra Group, as the lowest bidder for work items contained in the Base Bid totaling \$1,439,487.00.

Additive Bid items will be handled on a change order basis if needed.

RE: BCDC Permit Requirements for the Tule Red Habitat Restoration Project

The existing Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) permit for the Tule Red Habitat Restoration Project requires repairs to two existing California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) fishing piers located in Suisun Marsh, Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier and Island Slough Fishing Pier.

Engineering designs for repairs to the Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier as well as construction of an ADA parking pad and pad for a portable ADA restroom have been approved by BCDC and were included as an additive bid item in the Phase 2 solicitation. The bids received for repairs to the Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier were substantially higher than the engineer's opinion of probable cost (see attached).

Investigations of the Island Slough Fishing Pier indicate that the pier is in poor condition and that "repairs" would require new pilings and full replacement of the pier superstructure (see attached site photos).

To date, SFCWA has expended \$270,000 related to compliance with the BCDC permit (\$120,000 in predevelopment, design and permitting costs and another \$150,000 in a payment to the Coastal Conservancy for future public access improvements within Suisun Marsh). DWR has expended an additional \$200,000 on a Public Access Study that was required as a condition of the BCDC permit.

Based on the recent bids for Montezuma Slough, and preliminary engineer's estimates for Island Slough (which are likely low), the additional cost to SFCWA to comply with the current permit requirements could be in excess of \$600,000, which would bring total compliance cost to over \$870,000 (over \$1million including DWR expenditures).

On May 22, 2019 SFCWA sent a letter to BCDC expressing concerns regarding the Island Slough Fishing Pier and the costs associated with complying with the BCDC permit requirements (see attached). On May 30, 2019 staff from DWR, CDFW and I met with BCDC staff to discuss alternatives. BCDC staff expressed a willingness to consider alternative proposals for improving public access, including applying the \$150,000 payment to the Coastal Conservancy to improvements at the Island Slough site, but we did not agree on a specific proposal.

A follow-up meeting is scheduled with BCDC staff for June 27, 2019.

RE: Permit No. 2016.002.00md issued on August 23, 2016 (the "Permit")

Dear Pascale:

During our conversation on May 2, 2019 we had discussed amending the Permit issued to the State and Federal Contractors Water Agency and Westervelt Ecological Services, LLC (collectively the "Permittees").

Per the terms of the Permit, certain repairs and improvements to two off-site fishing piers owned by CDFW in Island Slough and Montezuma Slough were contemplated. Section II B of the Permit further provides that, "[i]n the event that the pier improvements cannot be completed as required below, the permittees shall propose and seek authorization to complete alternative comparable public access improvements."

The Permittees were initially asked to provide trail access on site for hiking, however, due to the location of the site and public safety concerns, the Permittees in consultation with CDFW suggested alternatives. This discussion regarding alternatives resulted in the award of cash grants, a public access study and certain improvements to the existing Montezuma Slough and Island Slough fishing piers.

With respect to Island Slough Pier, the Permittees had initially anticipated performing repairs, however, after investigating the structure of the pier, it was discovered that there was significant and substantial deterioration to both the pier and the levee system supporting the pier (see attached photos). Based on our engineer's assessment, an entire new pier would need to be constructed. Due to frequent overtopping of the levee and flooding of the road, the pier would need to be elevated above its current position, which would require significant additional ramping to allow for ADA access to the pier. The entrance to the pier is located in the shoulder of Grizzly Island Road creating limited space and a public safety issue. Parking for the pier is located across the road from the pier, creating a further safety concern as the public would have to cross a road to access the pier.

Estimated costs for the in-lieu public access improvements currently required under the permit are:

Public Access Study	\$200,000
Coastal Conservancy Payment	\$150,000
Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier	\$146,000
Island Slough Fishing Pier	\$384,000
Signage	\$ 13,000
	\$893,000

In light of the health and safety issues and the costs associated with constructing a new pier and levee system at Island Slough, the Permittees and CDFW would like to suggest an alternative. As an alternative, the Permittees would repair the Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier (as planned) and commit the \$150,000 Coastal Conservancy Payment for long-term maintenance for the Montezuma Slough Fishing Pier. The \$150,000 would provide for maintenance as well as potential repairs in the future. This type of approach would be consistent with the public access study that was commissioned by the Permittees which highlights the need for maintenance of existing facilities. The study further recommends a strategy to aid in identifying, selecting and implementing public access to comply with the McAteer-Petris Act and marsh development permit requirements that:

Support improvements, preventative maintenance, and routine operation and maintenance at existing facilities where funding is inadequate to avoid loss of existing access, amenities, and/or programs through in-kind or in-lieu fee contributions (page 6-2).

We look forward to discussing these options further and ultimately amending the Permit to reflect the alternative course of action.
